Always present and always on watch, the University Police Department continually protects and serves our campus community. With 11 sworn officers (including the Chief of Police, one lieutenant, and two sergeants), UPD enforces state and federal laws, patrols campus and surrounding areas, partners with local law enforcement agencies, provides security for events, and locks and unlocks campus buildings. Helping students, staff, and faculty by unlocking or jump-starting vehicles is just one example of "outreach" our UPD supports. Civilian training on security and safety are also provided by our men and women in blue.

Shop with a Cop, Men Who Cook, and various other local charitable events are all part of the campus and community outreach in which UPD officers participate. Since 2016, Kent Martin has held the position of Chief of Police and has implemented several civilian trainings and campus/community opportunities. Coffee with a Cop, ALICE (alert, lockdown, inform, counter, and evacuate) training, and the UPD Student Advisory Board are all opportunities for campus and community interaction.

UPD recently celebrated the graduation of two new officers from the Police Academy, Rodney Redfern III and Travis Schumacher. Redfern previously worked at EIU as a building service worker and both his father and father-in-law are retired UPD officers. Schumacher is originally from Altamont and lives in Mattoon.
