

Prakash Mathew served as the Vice President for Student Affairs at North Dakota State University (NDSU) from 2006-2014. He retired after 38 years of service in Student Affairs. Thirty-four of those years were spent at NDSU; four years were spent at Mankato State University. Mathew held positions including Hall Director, Director of Residence Life, Associate Dean and Dean of Student Life, and Vice President for Student Affairs.

Prakash Mathew has provided leadership in the Student Affairs profession at the state, regional, and national levels. He served NASPA (National Association of Student Affairs Administrators) and the Student Affairs profession as a member of the NASPA Foundation, the National Board of Directors, and as a regional Vice President. He also served on the Executive Committee for the Council of Student Affairs for APLU (Association of Public and Land-Grant Universities).
