

MINUTES OF THE INTERNATIONAL PROGRAMS ADVISORY COMMITTEE
November 5, 2004

The International Programs Advisory Committee met at 9:37 a.m. on Friday, November 5, 2004, in the Martinsville Room of the Martin Luther King, Jr. Union.

III. Agenda Items to be acted on.
Approval of the 2005 Short Term Study Abroad Proposal for Paris

Paris: Art History Study Abroad; Directors: Janet T. Marquardt & Stephen A. Canfield

- A. Stephen Canfield discussed some of the changes that were being made to the program this year and explained that an independent study project is being required of the students.
- B. Dr. Butt moved to approve the proposal and Dr. Kopel seconded the motion.
- C. A vote was taken and the above program was unanimously approved by IPAC.

Change in International Environment of Business Short-Term Proposal

- A. Roann Kopel stated that there was a change in the study abroad trip. Christie Roszkowski had been replaced by James Jordan-Wagner. Roann Kopel also brought up the fact that they were considering only offering 3 semester hours. After discussion, Pam Collins told Roann Kopel that the program cannot be reduced to 3 hours and that it can only be approved for 6 semester hours. The program needs to be modified to offer 2 courses, with one course which can be offered as an independent study.

IV. Reports

A. Dr. Robert Augustine (per Sue Songer)

1. International Courtyard Meeting was held on October 19, 2004 with Dagni Bredesen, Jill Nilsen, Steve Rich, Karla Evans, Sue Songer, Bill Elliott, Roann Kopel and Robert M. Augustine. No money is available and 100% of the funds will need to be raised. Sue Songer and Jill Nilsen had an initial meeting with Eulalee Anderson and she was quite helpful in obtaining information for contacting many international alums who might be able to help support this mission. The idea of the courtyard is very well supported to make a permanent memorial to our students around the world. Cost estimates are most likely over \$200,000.

B. William J. Elliott

1. Sue Songer explained that Bill was meeting with the Study Illinois group, as Chairman of Study Illinois today and that she was going to deliver Bill's report.
2. A memo (in hot pink) that references the mandated \$100 SEVIS fee which is to be paid before a student's VISA appointment is sent to all prospective students that have been accepted and are sent their I-20s. Dr. Butt suggested to check and see how other universities are handling the \$100 SEVIS fee and asked if NAFSA assist in trying to do something about this fee. Dr. Canfield suggested that we need to change the memo to reflect that there is no guarantee of a VISA, even though they are paying the \$100 fee.

C. Sue Songer

1. AIS participated in the EIU Homecoming Parade and won 3rd place in the Walking Division.
2. The International Forum held on October 20, 2004, had over 100 people attend and was a huge success. Sue hopes this will help the attendance at the following forums.
3. Ikefuma Nwosu's father, His Royal Highness, Dr. Gibson Nwosu, who is the King of the Awaka people of Nigeria and Chancellor of Usmanu Fodio University, the second oldest university in Nigeria, visited with several

members of International Programs and a luncheon was hosted in his honor. He is hoping to return for Ikefuma's graduation.

4. NAFSA Regional Conference is being held this week, November 6-9, 2004 in Ann Arbor, MI. Sue Songer, Bill Elliott, Adrienne Paladino and Elyse Lyons will be attending this conference. Sue and Bill were chosen to be mentors in NAFSA and will begin their first mentoring training at NAFSA.
5. IPAC members are encouraged to attend the November 16, 2004 International Forum on "Being Muslim at EIU."
6. IPAC members were asked to attend the Old Main Holiday Open House "Christmas Around the World" where the trees will be decorated by the international students. The dates are December 8, 2004 from 5-7 pm and December 9, 2004 from 10:00-11:30 am. International students will also be distributing international recipes.
7. Thursday, December 2, 2004 is the International Holiday Banquet. The William G. Kirk International Leadership Award will be presented to William G. Kirk at the banquet.

D. Elyse Lyons
